The Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) is a detailed account of the City's financial statements, notes, schedules, and statistics. The CAFR was prepared in conformance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and was audited by Mauldin, Jenkins, Certified Public Accountants, LLC, 439 Mulberry Street, Post Office Box 1877, Macon Georgia 31202-1877.







Location

The City of Griffin is located in Spalding County along Highway 16 just west of I-75 with easy access to Griffin-Spalding Municipal Airport.









More formally referred to as the Statement of Net Assets, the City's balance sheet reflects a strong and healthy financial condition as of June 30, 2012. Assets of the City exceeded its liabilities on June 30, 2012, by \$ 109 million (net assets). Total assets increased by \$ 4.1 million and the City's liabilities decreased by \$ 3.6 million, largely due to the reduction of debt and loan payoffs.

This statement presents information to show how the City's net assets changed during the year as a result of the financial activity (i.e. revenues and expenses). This is a summarized version of the more detailed income statement found in the City's complete Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.



The income statement shows that the City's net assets increased each year for the past five years. This reflects a strong fiscal mindset and stewardship in areas that fund future capital improvements. Revenues decreased (\$2.4 million) in 2012 from 2011 due to elimination in Federal Stimulus Funds (\$1.3M), and reductions in: SPLOST proceeds (\$400 thousand), Property Tax collections (\$200 thousand), Sales Tax Collections (\$200 thousand), and Charges for Services (\$300 thousand).





LEGAL DEBT MARGIN

As of June 30, 2012, the City had \$63.9 million outstanding in water revenue bonds, \$1.7 million in notes payable, \$44 thousand in capital leases, and \$4.4 million outstanding on buildings and vehicles.




This schedule is a summarized version of the more detailed statement of activities found in the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. Under Georgia finance law, the City's outstanding general obligation debt should not exceed 10 percent of total assessed property value. By law, the general obligation debt subject to the limitation may be offset by amounts set aside for repaying general obligation



STAFFING LEVELS (Full-time Equivalents)

The City of Griffin conducts a periodic market analysis of comparable jobs to update the pay plan. In 2012 the City held back on across the board pay increases. While health insurance costs increased, the City absorbed most of the increase. On average, the City contributes approximately 70 percent towards health care premiums and employees pay approximately 30 percent, comparable with other local municipalities. Costs for other employee benefits, including life and disability insurance, remained the same for 2012.
